year. Reforms to Definitive Map Modification Orders and exception regulations are scheduled for later on within the next 12 months.

vegetation clearance would probably be the type of work that would prove most effective. TS mentioned in North Crawley, a lot of this type of work is undertaken by himself and other parishes perhaps should follow this example. SH such a move if handled badly could increase conflict between users and landowners. Whilst in principle it seemed reasonable, it would need to be done cautiously and with the involvement of the MKCC RoW Team. JW outlined it was an area identified within the ROWIP and in principle would be something to welcome. However, the finer details and how such a group would work would need to be looked at. SC asked about the enforcement policy utilised by the RoW Team and how 6.2 the threat of and then actual enforcement were working in practice. JW explained the team use an 'ask, tell, demand' principle in dealing with matters. Generally, most landowners will comply with any requests and often it more a case of misunderstanding when issues arise. However there are occasions when such action is required. A recent example was provided where Highways Act Section 154 had been used as regards tree work with invoices being sent to landowners. 7.0 AOB 7.1 SH mentioned an upcoming Local Nature Recovery Strategy event is to be held locally for farmers. It will be held at the Caldecotte Arms on 18th March at 6pm. It was remarked it was a good thing and important that such events took place.
